President's Message

Things have calmed down slightly since Council made the decision to stay with Extension for another year. Although there are still some glitches to work out with U. C. Extension, everything seems to be on track, thanks to our hard-working Task Force, under the able leadership of Sol Silver. Incidentally, we may need to move our office in early June, to be sure we have uninterrupted internet/e-mail and telephone service, but classes and activities scheduled for 425 Market will continue to be held there. We have asked a broker to help us find office space, and that effort is being spearheaded by Roz Goldstein and Richard Magary.

To cover the increased costs of staying at Extension, Council decided on, and the General Membership approved, an increase of \$30 in our annual membership fees. Full membership will be \$250 and grandfathered Associate Members will pay \$150. The payment for Special Audiences was also raised to \$50. The remainder of our shortfall (probably around \$20,000) will be taken from our reserves.

However, we have to face the fact that Extension will not be available to us for 2010-2011. Though they spawned us, and nurtured us to maturity, we can no longer count on their support. And so we must begin the process of thinking independently. It may be that we'll need to "go it alone" in the sense of being a free-standing organization without affiliation with any educational institution. That would, of course, change the nature of CLIR quite radically—but not necessarily for the worse. Maybe even for the better. Or we may need to consider actually merging with another organization, and losing some of our independence. Those are both possibilities we have seriously resisted up to this point. But they may turn out to be our only viable options. Luckily, we're known as an open-minded organization, which will stand us in good stead as we face the future.

On a more positive note, our treasury benefited and members enjoyed our Mystery Auction. Thanks to our Chair, Joan Paddington, and everyone involved. Details on page 7.

Many wonderful classes and activities are planned for May—see the announcements elsewhere in this *Voice*. And remember to sign up for the Annual Luncheon on June 26. It's always a grand event and plans for this year follow that tradition.

We end a long visit to the Louvre, six months to become familiar with the huge museum's amazing collection of paintings that trace the history of European art from the Middle Ages until the mid-19th century. Along the way we learned of France's determination to develop the most famous museum in the world. (Think the *Mona Lisa*, Rembrandt, the

Winged Victory, Rubens) We started with France's rivalry with Italy, from whose style developed the Spanish school of painting, along with Flemish and Dutch art. French skills and expertise increased with De La Tour, Claude, Watteau, Boucher, Fragonard and David.

Professor Bretell will discuss Delacroix and Ingres in his last class, paving the way for France's next big art movement—Impressionism.

Transition—Francis Gates

An active CLIR Member since 1991, Francis died March 24 after a long illness. A California native, he served in the Army, studied at UC Berkeley, earning several degrees, and was admitted to the California Bar in 1963. During his career as a law librarian, Francis held positions at several west coast and eastern universities, including that of Director of the Law Library and Professor of Law at Columbia University Law School. In 1984 he became Circuit Librarian for the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals from which he retired in 1991. During his time at CLIR, Francis enjoyed all facets of the organization, with art, investing and photography classes just a few of his interests. A superb cook, he was a long-time and greatly appreciated member of the Hospitality Committee.

Francis is survived by his partner of 38 years and spouse, Charles Stewart, and numerous relatives.
